CHAIR'S REPORT

I find it hard to believe I am writing my 11th and final Chairperson's Annual Report for Southern Volunteering SA. I decided to retire on 30th June this year – my time was up.

When I was asked to take over the Chair position from retiring Chairperson Graeme Purdie, who had held the reign for 11 years, I thought there was no way in the world would I endure that distance.

So why did I last 11 years? – because SVSA is a remarkable organisation which has provided a pathway for thousands of people into volunteering which has transformed their lives, propelled people into an area of activity that they may not have been aware of, and simultaneously helped the community or environment in some way.

The beauty about volunteering is that anyone from any walk of life can volunteer from any socio-economic group for any length of time and be involved in a widely diverse range of activities.

Despite loss of two-thirds of our core Federal Government funding over the last 4 years, SVSA has continued to deliver for the 41st year since 1984) invaluable Volunteer Resource Centre (VRC) services in the Southern Adelaide Metropolitan and Fleurieu regions.

The highlights page documents the extraordinary number of people supported by our VRC in 2024/25 including:

- 2,499 volunteers referred to Volunteer Involving Organisations (VIOs)
- Over 1,400 enquiries from individuals and VIOs actioned
- 63 volunteers from priority groups were given specialist assistance in face-to-face interviews
- Our high quality website was further enhanced with additional resources for individuals and VIOs
- And importantly, SVSA informed and supported over 160 VIO's in the regions through 14 network meetings and training sessions, 27 email bulletins and 683 social media posts. A remarkable amount of educational input which we know from feedback, was highly valued by the sector.

In addition, SVSA continued to deliver the Aged Care Volunteer Visitors Scheme (ACVVS) for the 33rd year (since (1992) with 100 volunteers making 4,178 visits to 254 Aged Care Recipients in Aged Care Facilities or their homes. Not only that, SVSA has delivered the statewide coordination and national community of practice contracts.

And all the above has been delivered by only 5 part time staff (3.3 full time equivalent) and 6 volunteers.

Ultra thanks to our staff:

- Our CEO Mel Kerton who has been on a continuous adaptation curve over the last few years and been responsible for singularly managing multiple "departments" as well as being required to deliver most of the VRC program this year – an incredible effort.
- Our ACVVS team of Jo Rees, Renai Casey, Lynne Arbon and Kate Lucas who have collectively built high credibility from the Government and the volunteer aged sector through their professional and expert delivery and statewide coordination of the ACVVS program.

Our volunteers Jill Spink (Minutes Secretary), Kerry Jaunutis and John Pengilly (Volunteer Referral Officers), Mary Woolaway and Robyn Spear-Brewin (various roles in the Fleurieu) and Val Shaughnessy (ACVVS Volunteer Support) have been superb and SVSA would be struggling without them.

Our dedicated volunteer Board Members could not have done a better job in executing the governance role and providing excellent advice and support. We have operated as a professional team and come from a wonderful humanist and realistic value base. Super-special thank yous to:

- Cathie Vincent who was my Vice-Chairperson for 10 years and been an incredulous source of support, professional advice and knowledge.
- Jannine Richards who courageously has fought health problems but continued to monitor and manage our finances for 10 years which has enabled SVSA to extend its life despite big funding cuts.
- Paul Kennedy, Jonette Thorsteinsen, Kerry Jaunutis and John Pengilly for their unique contributions and belief in the organisation.
- And lastly, I can't thank Mal Sutcliffe enough for taking on the role as Chairperson – it is a great relief that a person with such competence and leadership has replaced me.

When I joined SVSA in 2014 we had received stable funding from the Federal Government since 1992 for the VRC program. Since 2017 it has been one long battle where funding guidelines were changed dramatically restricting assistance to specific priority groups which basically wrecked the whole core ethos of volunteering. Funding has been cut and all our submissions and lobbying have got nowhere despite politicians saying what a wonderful service we are!

Funding and lobbying fatigue has resulted from my perspective as Chair. As I said in my farewell speech in June, it feels like we have been aligned with The Beatles Magical Mystery Tour and journeyed into a Funding Fantasy Land - the wonderful world of Government funding.

On a positive note, one of the ideas which SVSA has attempted to advocate for over the years is linking community organisation goals to the United Nations 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) This is a global vision agreed by 193 countries to enhance the world in relation to people, planet, prosperity and peace through partnership, including partnership through volunteering. I note that in an increasing number of annual reports organisations are reporting against the SDGs. In my view the world needs to take on these goals to provide a united, positive world vision.

In conclusion, I wish SVSA and all involved a positive, long-term future in continuing to enhance Southern Adelaide and the Fleurieu communities through volunteering.

From Malcolm Sutcliffe, current Chairperson (from 1st July 2025)

As the new Chairperson, I have only a few words to add to John's report.

Firstly, I extend a respectful hand of friendship to John and acknowledge the work he has contributed during his tenure as Chairperson. VOLUNTEER SUPPORT SERVICES

Volunteer Referral Service

We have observed an increase in the number of people who are willing to search for volunteer vacancies online once they are directed in how to do so. With the closure of the Christies Beach office in June 2024, we moved to offering a referral service to those still preferring a face to appointment, on a community outreach basis. Kerry Jaunutis, wonderful volunteer referral officer in the South and Robyn Spear-Brewin on the Fleurieu have delivered this service over the last year. They have met people in community and talked to them about volunteering vacancies that suit their requirements, and then referred them to any organisations they select. Over the year they have conducted 60 interviews.

Sector Support

Resource Development

This year SVSA has added to its range of online resources to support volunteers and Volunteer Managers. Namely:

Email Updates

We utilised regular email correspondence to share our monthly newsletter Info Links, promote training and networking opportunities, and share up-to-date information to Volunteer Managers and others who have joined our mailing list.

State Volunteer Manager Network Meetings

In collaboration with Northern Volunteering and Volunteering SA & NT we delivered 4 state network meetings for Volunteer Managers to attend for networking, mutual support and information sharing.

Research

We completed Regional Research on the challenges for Volunteer Managers on the Fleurieu Peninsula. We also conducted similar research on a smaller scale in the City of Onkaparinga.

Additionally we have:

- Continued our partnership with the Fleurieu Sun newspaper to highlight local volunteers in numerous organisations
- Made familiarisation visits to member volunteer-involving organisations
- Delivered numerous presentations as requested
- Attended events and expos to promote volunteering

PROJECT WORK

Volunteerability

Now in it's sixth year of delivery after two successive funding extensions, the Volunteerability project, of which we are a partner with Orana and Northern Volunteering, goes from strength to strength.

In the July 24 - June 25 period **421** people participated in Disability Awareness sessions and **56** people with disability were supported to engage in a volunteering pathway.

Palliative Care Volunteering SA

Another project extended beyond it's original 15 month funding, was the Palliative Care Volunteering SA project. Led by Palliative Care SA we are collaborative partners along with Northern Volunteering and Volunteering SA & NT. We provide support and connections to palliative care volunteers, organisations, and volunteer managers to improve the experience of families throughout the state. This is achieved by delivering training, resources and support for volunteers and Volunteer Managers.

WHAT OUR MEMBERS VALUE

With our volunteer program operating on a statewide basis, having Southern Volunteering available to support our southern operational needs has been invaluable. Mel and her team are inspirational in managing to achieve what they do on the extremely limited funding they are provided with. Many thanks Mel & team - you are appreciated! (I will be in touch re our needs at Victor Harbor!).

Although we have not used all of Southern Volunteering's services, we do believe they are of the best quality and well support our volunteering sector. We continue to work as partners with Southern Volunteering as they demonstrate a professional, transparent, inclusive and respectful partner. Strengths of each organisation are understood and utilised together to best support the sector.

The workshops are very useful and I appreciate the help with advertising roles for us.

You are very good at relationship building.

Thank you to staff and volunteers that work effectively in this region. Prompt, efficient and focused service. I am very appreciative of the work they do as I feel very supported and informed of changes in the sector. This funding is imperative to support volunteer managers in the area, help recruit and train volunteers and keep volunteering high on the political agenda....volunteering in our community doesn't just happen without the resources and funding to keep services running and to stretch that dollar! Keep up the great work!

All staff of Southern Volunteering provide the same level of excellence in all of their services.

Local relationships are important, especially when trying to carve roles for volunteers. It is not possible for the peak body to do all stakeholder engagement in an efficient and meaningful way. It needs more people on the ground - place based engagement.

WHAT OUR MEMBERS VALUE

We value Southern Volunteering managing our ads for volunteers on various websites and then screening the Expressions of Interests. As a small NFP, we cannot afford to hire a dedicated Volunteer Manager so for Southern Volunteering to keep track of the referrals is invaluable for us.

Limited scope to recruit volunteers without the assistance of Southern Volunteering. Local research initiatives are fantastic and provides important information back to local, state and federal government about the trends in volunteering and how important it is to keep our communities connected and services available for vulnerable people, sporting clubs and environmental initiatives. They keep volunteering high on the agenda for our region with a gentle reminder to many aged care organisations through our regional forum. The ACVVS scheme has been a great service to refer residents to.

The ability to pick up the phone and speak to someone or send an email regarding an issue/concern and know that you will receive a response, is amazing. Your issue/concern is taken seriously and just doesn't stop at a response, there is the check in a few days later. A recommendation and that recommendation coming through to assist or again point you in the right direction. This service is priceless, and we would be lost without it.

We have had some volunteers important to our Gallery come to us from Southern Volunteering. We are 100% volunteer run, without these volunteers we would close.



AGED CARE VOLUNTEER VISITORS SCHEME



This Australian Government funded scheme supports volunteer visits to provide friendship and companionship to older people. Southern Volunteering is one of around 140 community organisations that recruit and support volunteers to visit socially isolated older Australians. This year our program provided **4,178** visits to **254** aged care recipients. We also deliver the state network member role and one of the national community of practices roles for the program.

Thanks to her, I have someone to chat with, laugh with, share my troubles with, and go out for coffees with"


"His favourite song is 'Give Me a Home Among the Gum Trees'. I played the ukulele and we sang together."

It's been an absolute honour to spend meaningful time - to sit, laugh, reminisce and simply be with these wonderful people as they move through this chapter of life. This year has taught me about presence, patience and kindness in its quietest forms. Volunteering isn't just about "giving back". It's about learning how to truly show up for people. Thank you Southern Volunteering for this incredible opportunity. With my heart full of nothing but gratitude"

TREASURER'S REPORT

Income

Income for this financial year was \$455,122. Fortunately, all partnership work with Volunteering SA& NT, Orana (for the Volunteerability project) and Palliative Care SA was extended from 1st July 2024 for a further 12 months. The Department of Health, Ageing and Disability funding for the Aged Care Volunteer Visitors Scheme covered three contracts, for the main service provision, State Network Member and COP Coordinator.

Expenditure

A major part of the income is used for salary payments. Other income was carefully expended on administration, program delivery and operating costs. Over half of grant funds for ACVVS were expended on salary payments, with the volunteer reimbursements, training and administration of the service making up the other major expenditure.

Summary

Southern Volunteering ends the 2024-25 financial year with a surplus of \$920.

Conclusion

Southern Volunteering has endured another financially difficult year. The decision to close the Christies Beach office and restructure the staff team (meaning the loss of two valued employees) in June 2024, reduced the projected 24-25 deficit, but put an extra operational burden on remaining staff members and volunteers.

We have had no income to wholly fund us to deliver the broad core objectives.

I would like to thank the staff, volunteers and Board for their continued resilience over the last year, constantly having to adapt and think out of the box to enable Southern Volunteering to continue to deliver the successful volunteer support services needed we know are by our communities.

I struggled with my decision to retire from being Treasurer in June, as I have enjoyed every moment with Southern Volunteering. I would personally like to thank Mel and all the staff for their continuous assistance during my health concerns over the last few years. I wish Southern Volunteering the very best for the future and hope to see everything running successfully for years to come.



Having celebrated their 100th birthday last ear, the Victor Harbor Girl Guides is a branch of Guiding in South Australia, and a member of World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts.

Girl Guides empowers girls and young wom-en to try new things, experience adventure, and grow confidence, leadership and teamwork skills.

One of their volunteers, Susan Gower, was born shortly after the end of World War II. She has spent most of her life in rural areas,

where everyone in her family did voluntary work of one sort or another.

When Susan's daughter joined Brownies she was asked to become the Leader of one of the Brownies packs in town - so she has been volunteering with Girl Guides for more 50 years.

Her application process was as easy as having a chat and doing some training, which she need-ed to repeat several times each time she moved sections, as there was no uniformity in training

The Fleurieu Cancer Support Foundation (FCSF) provides support and transport services to and from Adelaide for cancer patients within the southern Fleurieu Peninsula.

It receives no government or council fund-ing, raises all its own money, and is completely rolunteer run.

One of its wonderful volunteers is Robin

Robin and her late husband retired to Port Elliot 22 years ago, and needed to use the FCSF transport service over many years during her late husband's illness.

She said the drivers treated them with respect and kindness, and that nothing was too

After her husband passed, Robin wanted to give something back to this group, and so be-gan her volunteer journey. The application process was simple, with just a bit of paperwork and a police clearance,

just a bit of paperwork and a police clearance, which was organised by the secretary of the FCSE Heather.

After Robin's successful application, she needed training to learn how the FCSF worked and its office procedures, which was readily given by Heather and another reception vol-

unteer.

Robin said she gained a lot of satisfaction helping someone, even just a little bit, on their journey with cancer, and it has broadened her horizons through meeting people she would normally not come in contact with.



"I feel good when I have helped someone on the way to organising transport to their various appointments, which is always a huge relief when you are not really feeling well and not sure which direction your life is taking." she said.

Robin believes the community could not function without volunteers and she always recommends volunteering to other people because "you never know when you may be the one who requires help".

"There is always some way you can help out, so come and see us and volunteer," she
